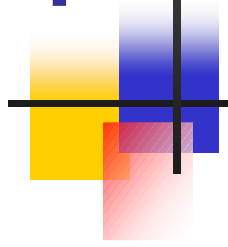


Mayor Menino's College Success Goal

- **Double the college graduation rate for college enrollees from BPS Class of 2011**

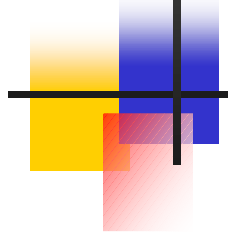

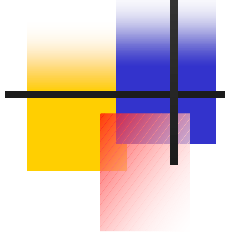
Getting ready....

- Ensure rigorous instruction and a challenging core curriculum for every BPS student (BPS)
- Double the number of AP classes over five years (BPS)
- Offer International Baccalaureate (BPS)
- Provide year-round access to credit recovery programs (BPS)
- Offer ACCUPLACER in Grade 11 to determine the academic preparation necessary to qualify for college credit courses (BPS)
- Provide jobs and internships for high school students to develop workplace skills, academic motivation and college/career aspiration (PIC)



Getting in...

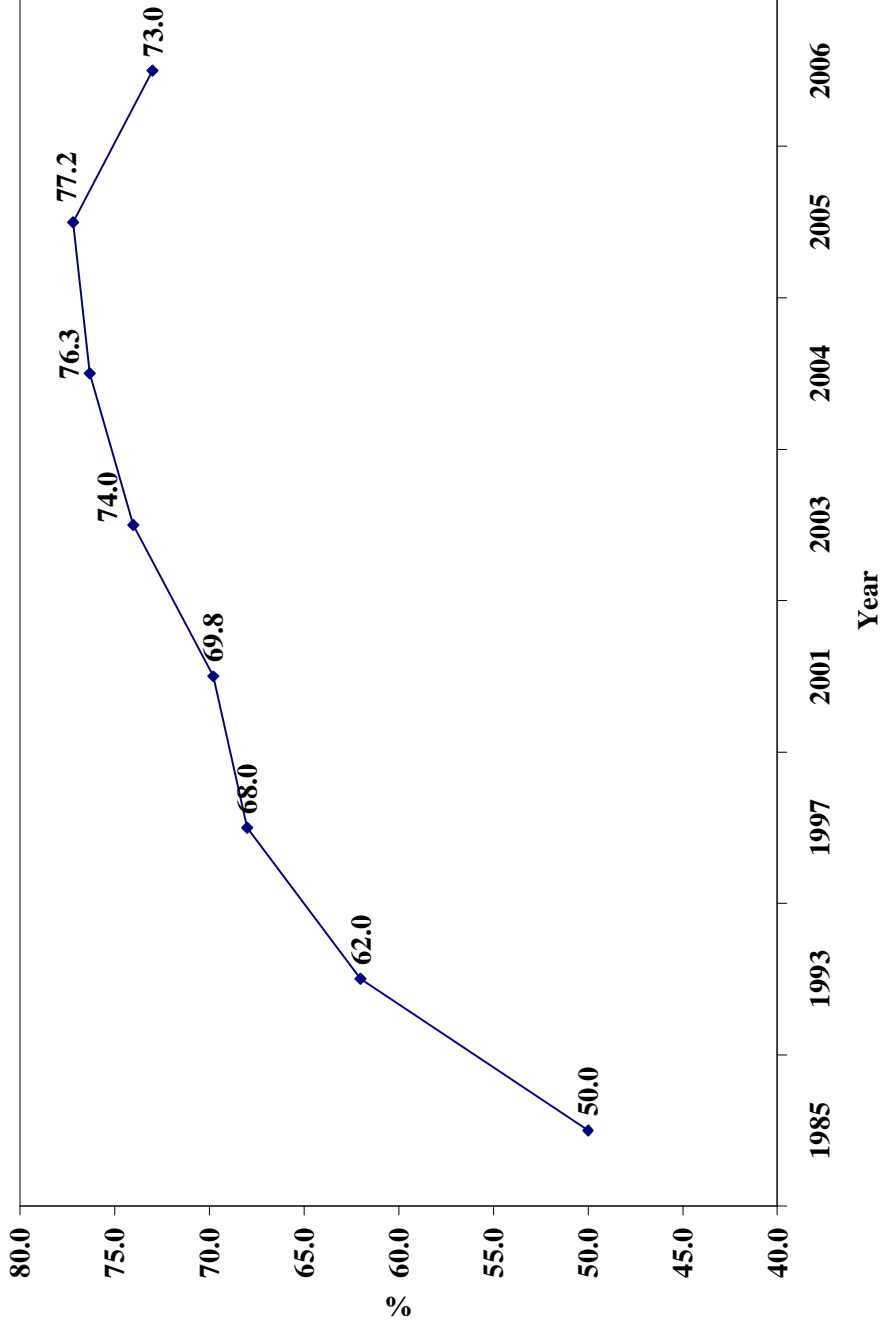
- Achieve a combined average SAT score of 1650 district-wide by increasing access to SAT prep programs (BPS)
- Redesign guidance and college counseling services to ensure access, alignment and consistency (BPS)
- Provide \$1 million in annual funding to support access and the transition to college (The Boston Foundation)
- Offer release time for SAT prep and college readiness activities within summer job experiences (PIC)



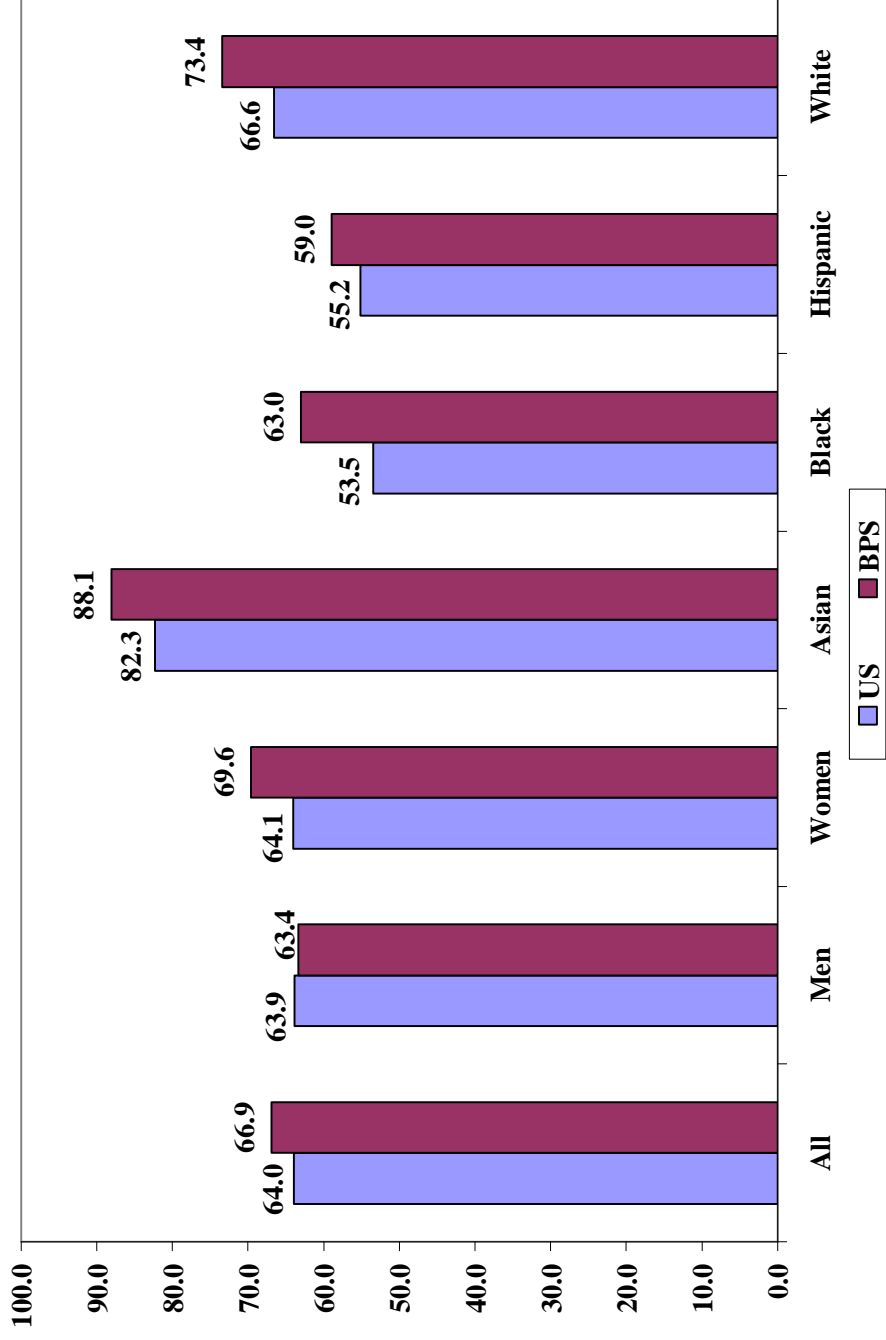
Getting through...

- Offer comprehensive support services such as mentoring, financial aid counseling, college skill development and career coaching (colleges, non-profits)
- Develop academic and social programs to ensure college retention and graduation (colleges, non-profits)
- Conduct proactive outreach to connect BPS graduates to programs and services, especially during the critical first year (colleges, non-profits)
- Provide jobs and internships for BPS graduates attending local colleges and universities, related to academic program and career aspiration (PIC)
- Track student progress and report results from these new collaborations and services (BPS, PIC, CLMS, colleges, non-profits)

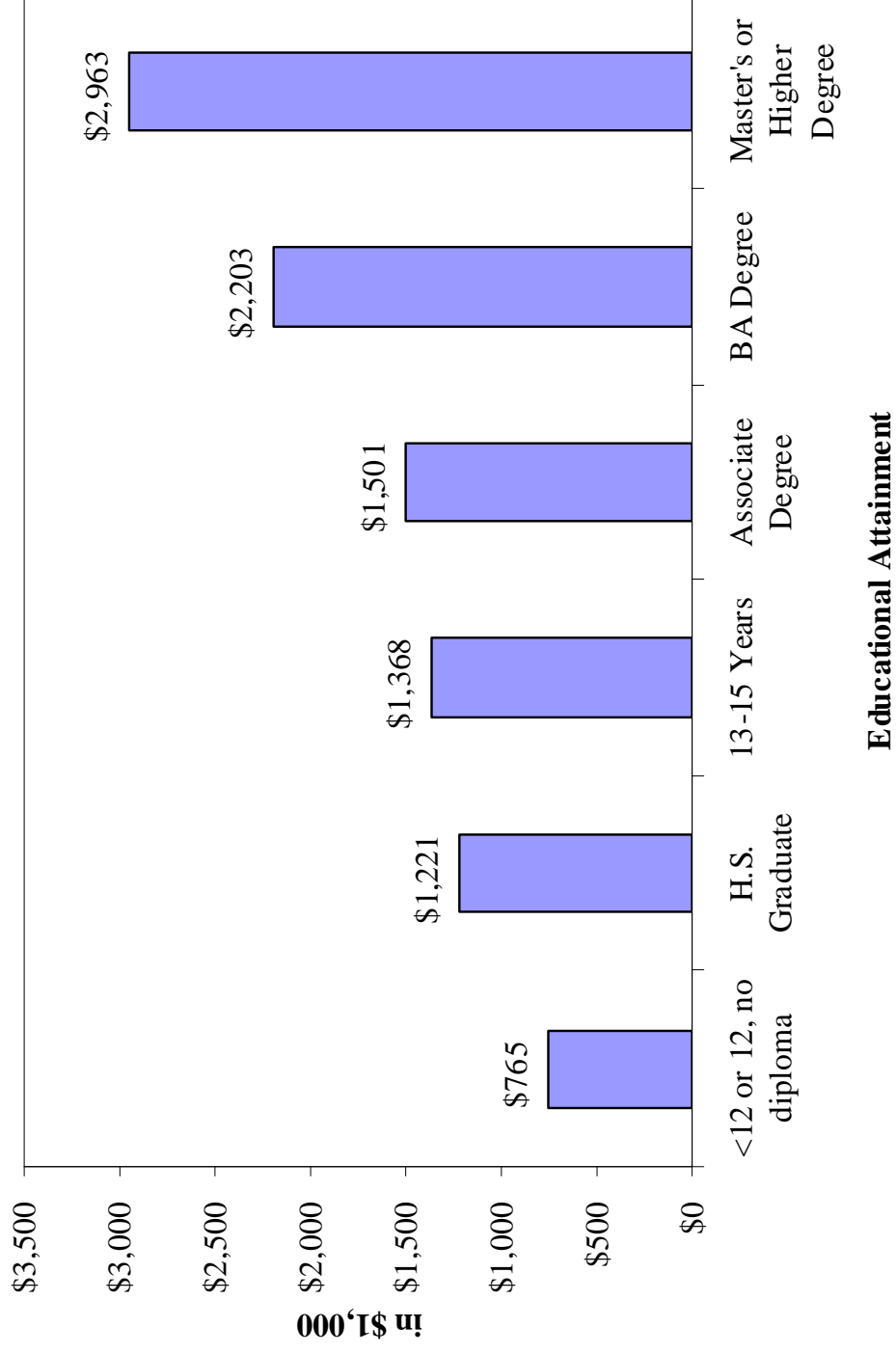
BPS Postsecondary Enrollment Rates, 1985-2006



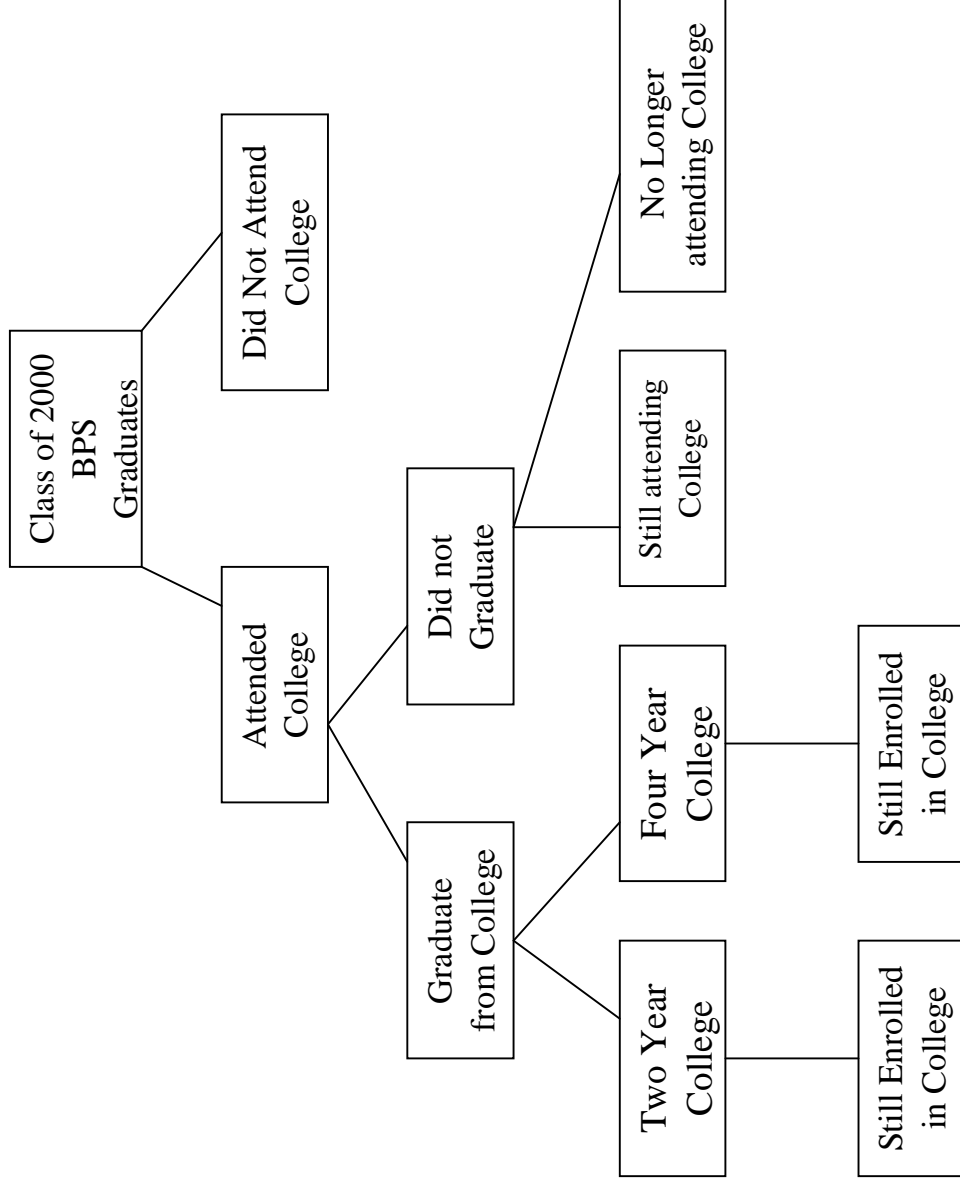
Postsecondary Enrollment: BPS Class of 2006 vs. National Average



Mean Lifetime Earnings of 18-64 Year Old Massachusetts Adults by Educational Attainment (2005 Dollars)



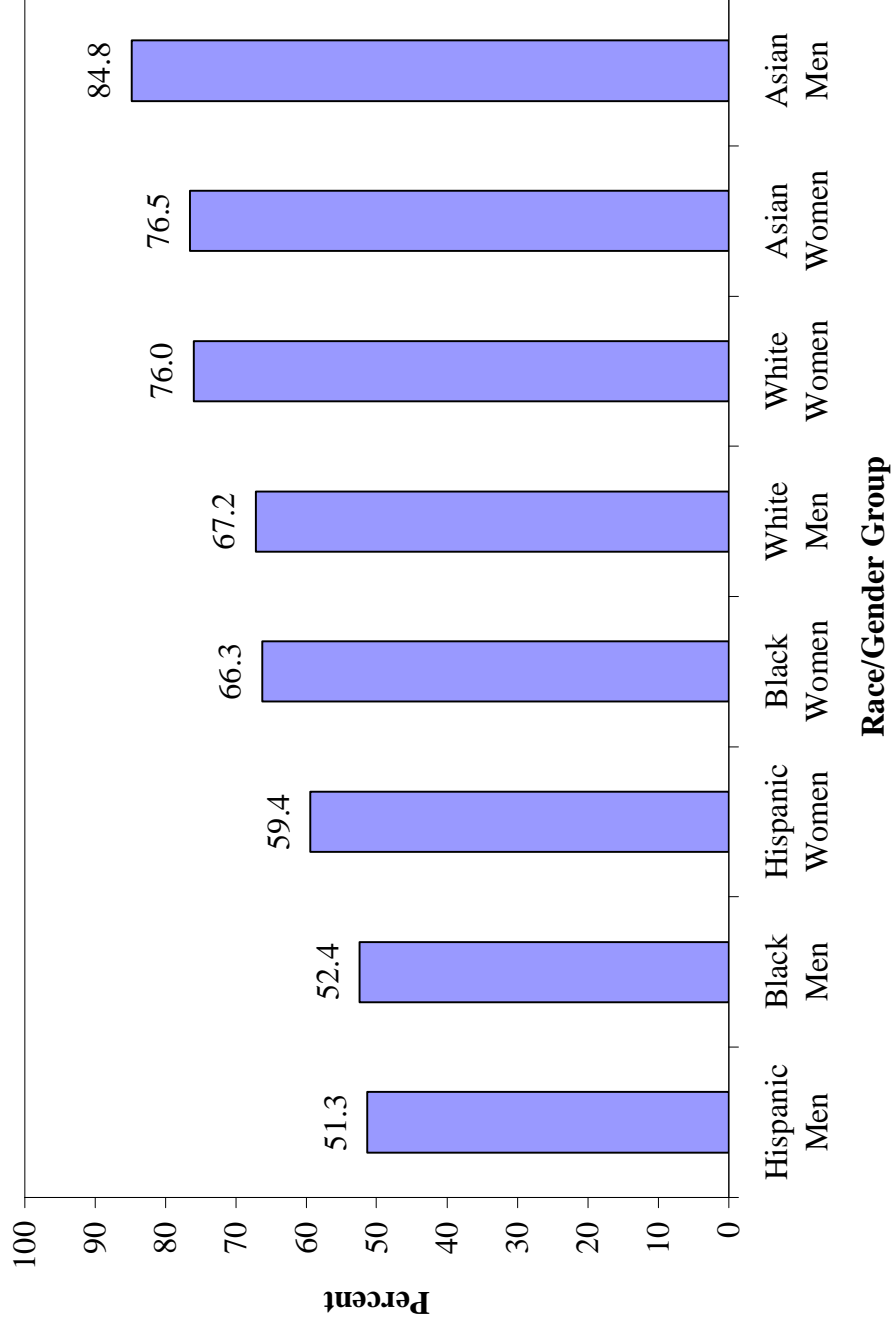

College Enrollment Rates by Gender / Race-Ethnic Group Class of 2000



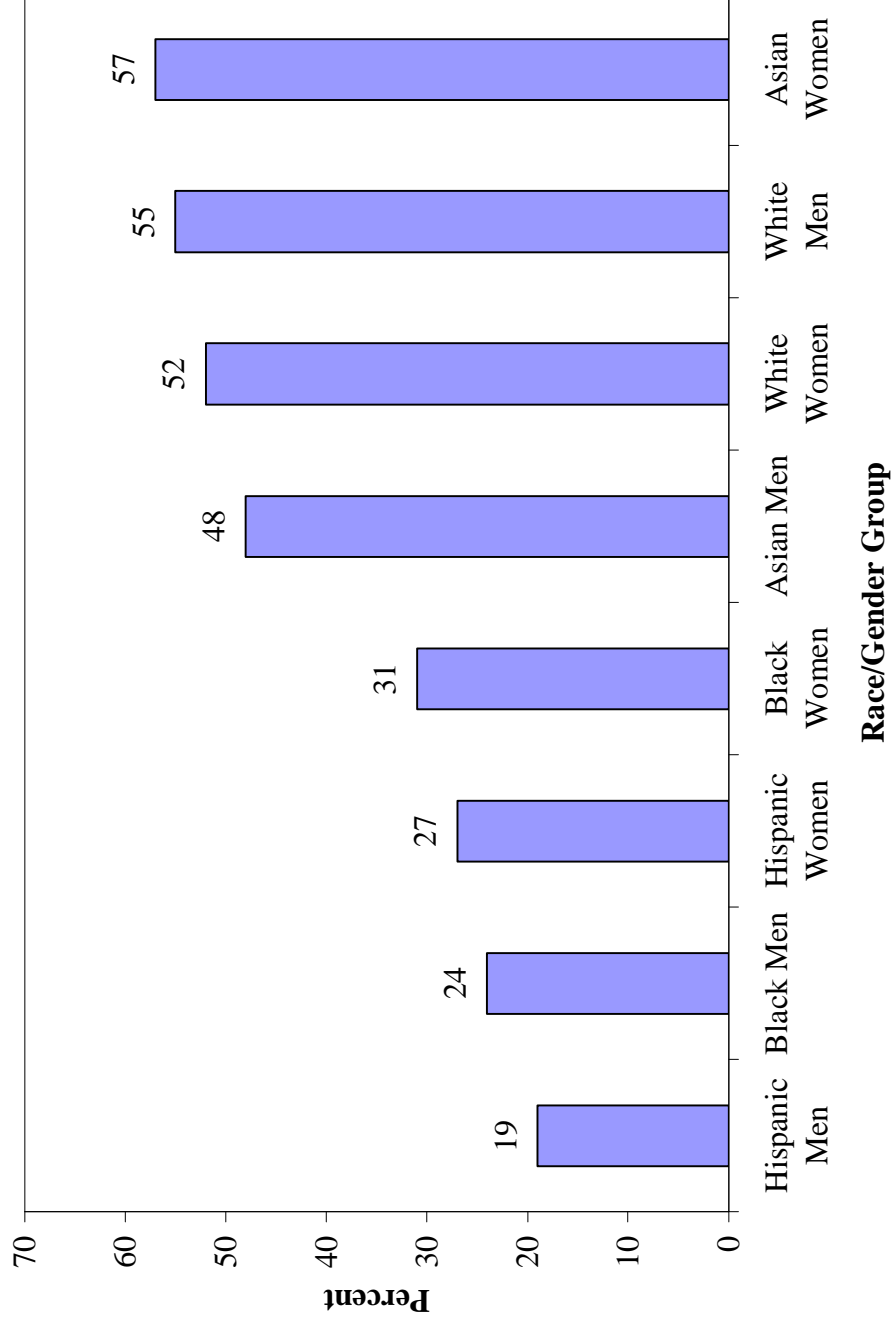
