Grant Description

The purpose of the federally-funded Massachusetts 21st Century Community Learning Centers (CCLC) – Summer Enhancement grant is to support additional learning time for students in grades K-12 during the summer- in addition to the funds already set aside for summer from the site's FY16 allocation. This additional time on learning provides creative and engaging academic enrichment opportunities that will help to address college and workforce readiness and success. Priorities include: assist in closing the proficiency gaps where they currently exist; provide creative and innovative programming that complements the students' school-day program, by embedding academics into high interest enriching activities; and integrate school-day and out-of-school-time programs to promote shared learning goals, teaching and support strategies, and staff recruitment and training activities.

- ~75% Stipends for teachers
- ~25% Contracts for non-BPS staff

Specific, Measurable, Attainable, Realistic, and Time-bound (SMART) Goals

Goal #1: 85% of students participating in programs at the **English** will improve ELA performance by at least 10% from the pre-test to the post-test.

Indicator: Rate of growth will be measured by the Survey of Academic Youth Outcomes Pre- and Post-Assessments for Teachers (SAYO-T), a measure developed by the National Institute for Out-of-School Time for this use by MADESE.

Goal #2: There will be at least a 10% increase in the percentage of **English** High School students attending at least 80 hours of OST programming (the minimum amount of time determined to make a significant different in academic and social progress by MA DESE) in comparison to the 62% of students who attended 80+ hours of programming in 2014-2015 school year.

Indicator: Program attendance data.

Goal #3: Reading levels in the **Frederick** program will increase by at least 10% for 85% of students. Several strategies will be employed to help students improve their reading abilities including ASPIRE library, book club and staff professional development.

Indicator: Pre- and post-SAYO-T assessments, ELA Teachers' Monthly Objectives Calendar submitted to School Administration, A-Net assessments, and Reading Level assessments.

Grant Description

The purpose of this state-funded grant is to encourage existing Summer Food Service Programs (SFSP) sponsors to increase participation in the program by serving more children per day and to extend the length of the SFSP.

BPS SFSP currently provides nutritious meals to our students throughout the summer months by bringing the food to our students. BPS services a diverse student population at a variety of sites across the city including summer school sites, community centers, and local independent summer camps and youth serving organizations. BPS aims to increase participation by streamlining our site outreach and operations, particularly at (but not limited to) BPS facilities.

- ~41% will be used towards non-instructional equipment
- ~22% will be used towards advertising and printing materials
- ~34% will be used towards non-instructional supplies
- ~3% will be used contractual services (SFSP Outreach Coordinator)

Goal #1: Increase average daily participation (ADP) by 5,000 students per day for the Summer Food Service Program. **Indicator:** ADP for lunch in Summer 2015 was ~11,000. FNS aims to increase ADP by 30% in Summer 2016.

Grant Description

The purpose of this state-funded Start-Up grant program is to encourage existing Summer Food Service Program (SFSP) sponsoring agencies to sponsor new sites in order to increase program availability to participants not currently receiving program services.

BPS SFSP currently provides nutritious meals to our students throughout the summer months by bringing the food to our students. BPS services a diverse student population at a variety of sites across the city including summer school sites, community centers, and local independent summer camps and youth serving organizations. Although many feeding sites reapply from year to year, we anticipate hosting new sites with high participating programs to make summer meals more accessible for children 2-18 in the City of Boston.

- ~86% will be used towards non-instructional equipment
- ~5% will be used towards advertising the SFSP in local media outlets
- ~8% will be used towards instructional and non-instructional supplies
- ~1% will be used towards a consultant; SFSP Outreach Coordinator position.

Grant Description

Title II funding is intended to increase student academic achievement by improving teacher and principal quality. This includes increasing the number of highly qualified teachers in classrooms, improving the skills of principals and assistant principals in schools, and increasing the effectiveness of teachers and principals. The FY16 Title II allocation will provide strong starts for new teachers and advancement opportunities for veteran teachers, promote diversity in hiring through targeted efforts of our Human Capital Diversity team, and provide support for the Reading Recovery program.

- ~40% of the grant will be allocated to personnel working on evaluation, recruitment and retention, diversity team support and performance management for BPS' Human Capital
- ~40% will be used to pay for stipends for the early hiring initiative, new teacher development programs, and diversity initiatives.
- ~10% will be allocated to non-public schools based on an equitable per student rate
- ~7% will be used to support our programs to recruit, develop and train a cohort of teachers reflective of racial, cultural and linguistic diversity of our Boston students

Specific, Measurable, Attainable, Realistic, and Time-bound (SMART) Goals

Goal #1: New Teacher Development - In FY16, all new teachers will receive school-based new teacher development programming.

Indicator: Since this is the first year of implementation, our goal is that 80% of new teachers rate the mentoring, coaching, and professional development they receive as effective.

Goal #2: During the 2015-16 school year, our goal is that 95% of teachers and administrators receive performance evaluations on-time according to state regulations.

Indicator: Formative assessment, formative evaluations, and summative evaluations.

Goal #3: During the 2015-16 hiring season 25% of teachers hired for the upcoming school year will identify as black. **Indicator:** Employee self-reporting
