







# Summer Early Focus (K1-2)

- In Summer Early Focus, K1-2nd grade students will to engage in high-quality instructional activities, take field trips and have structured and unstructured play opportunities.
- July 6 August 6, 2021
- Eligibility: Student in K1-2
- Budget: ~\$1.7 Million
- Projected Number of Seats: 500


## 5th Quarter Summer Learning Academies (K0-12)

- Summer Learning Academies are 5-week, non-credit programs focused on academic acceleration and enrichment, run by a school or CBO with interest-based experiences, like STEM, sailing, soccer, or arts.
- July 6 August 6, 2021
- Eligibility: Any students in grades K-12
- Budget: ~\$3.2 Million
- Projected Number of Seats: 4,950
- Number of Programs: 57

# 5th Quarter Summer Credit Recovery (6-12)

- Credit Recovery Programs are offered by schools as a way for students to complete/recover course credits.
- July 6 August 6, 2021
- Eligibility: Students in grades 6-12 who need to complete or recover course credits
- Budget: ~\$1.4 Million
- Projected Number of Seats: 3,005
- Number of Programs: 23 Schools



# OEL Summer Learning (Rising 3-12)

- OEL offers programs focused on grade-level academic skills in Math and ESL/ELA to support the English language development process of English Learner students.
- July 6 August 6, 2021
- Eligibility: English Learner Students in Grades K-12 with priority given to students receiving compensatory services, SLIFE and students at levels ELD 1-3s.
- Budget:~\$2.5 Million
- Projected Number of Seats: 2500

# Extended School Year ESY (K-12+)



- The Extended School Year (ESY) is a five (5) week\*, five (5) day, five (5) hour per day summer program for students with disabilities whose Individualized Education Plan (IEP) Teams have identified are at risk of substantial regression of skills over the summer.
- Dates: July 12 -August 20, 2021\*
- Eligibility: IEP
- Budget: ~\$7 million
- Projected Number of Seats: ~4,859
- 2021 anticipated attendance: ~3,322
- Content: ELA, Math, IEP Driven Goals, STEM, Counseling,
  Rules-Based Reading & Related Services

<sup>\*</sup>ESY 2021 will be extended by one week to provide students with additional learning opportunities due to COVID-19 school closures.

## Special Education Summer Learning (K-12+)



#### **Proposed Compensatory Service Schedule**

- 9:00-9:15: SEL Lesson or Morning Meeting
- 9:15-10:00: Literacy or Math Instruction (depending on Compensatory need)
- 10:00-10:15: SEL Lesson or Movement Break
- 10:15-11:00: Literacy or Math Instruction (depending on compensatory need)
- 11:00-11:45: Related Service Delivery or Guided instruction (depending on Compensatory need)
- 11:45-12: Close and dismissal

- For Summer 2021, The Office of Special Education(OSE) will partner with Catapult Learning to provide a Summer Learning Academy to provide Compensatory services to Students with Disabilities whose Individualized Education Plan (IEP) Teams have identified have experienced a regression of skills during the closure period of March 2020-June 30, 2020.
- Dates: July 12 -August 13, 2021
- Eligibility: Compensatory meeting with COSE and IEP teams
- Content: ELA, Math, IEP Driven Goals, STEM,
  Counseling, Rules-Based Reading & Related Services



# Learn & Earn Initiative

- A collaboration between the City of Boston's Office of Workforce Development, youth summer employment intermediaries, and local colleges, this model demonstrated promising results for paying students to participate in college-level coursework during the summer.
- Six-week courses are aligned to career fields and academic majors
- Eligibility: Based on family income levels
- Budget: \$720,000
- Projected Seats: 150 slots city-wide

# PIC Summer Job Placements for BPS Students

- The Boston Private Industry Council (PIC) is currently working to secure private sector placements, internships, and service industry jobs for BPS students
- They are the only intermediary agency with career specialist across BPS high schools working directly with students on career development, application support, and interview skills
- Eligibility: BPS High School Students
- Projected Number of Seats: 1,650

# Citywide Youth Employment Opportunities

#### **ABCD Summer Works**

Students ages 14-21 can access paid
 opportunities that gives back to the community

### **Youth Options Unlimited (YOU)**

Places youth who have been justice involved or disenfranchised, in paid opportunities at community-based organizations for 25 hours per week for 6-7 weeks.

#### Youth Engagement Employment (YEE)

 Opportunity for students 15-18 to work in arts, government & advocacy, STEM, sports & recreation, childcare, education, and more

#### **MLK Scholars**

 Comprehensive summer jobs program with personal development, leadership, and financial literacy workshops for students
